

## **Astoria Ukulele Orchestra: Connection Through Music**

Community members can feel isolated even if they are good musicians or have never picked up an instrument. The nonprofit <u>Astoria Ukulele Orchestra</u> was formed in 2020 to help accomplished or new players experience the joy of making music in a group. The 12 members improve their skills through practice and share their love of a wide range of songs with each other and the community at large through public performances outdoors and in local theaters.

The <u>social benefits</u> of playing and listening to music are well documented: music increases contact, coordination, and cooperation with others; gives us an oxytocin boost; and strengthens empathy and cultural cohesion. Individuals often experience increased hand and finger agility as well as reinforced cognitive health; the group feels a sense of purpose through community service by playing for local fundraisers and for Make Music Day; and the Arts Council of Clatsop County's mission is furthered by serving as the fiscal sponsor for the orchestra.
